The Book Thief

- 2. **Annotate**. Use post it notes to mark or keep a log of the major conflict(s) and how the conflict(s) is/are resolved. *If you keep a log, be sure to note the event and include the page number.
- 3. **Submit the reader response sheet** on first day of school. Complete the required reader response sheet for the book. There are 10 questions. It will be collected online and graded. Electronic copies are online (see below). **You NEED TO put your answers on a Google Document. If you have a computer, you NEED TO type your paragraphs on a Google Document. If you don't have a computer, write them on paper to type when you get your Chromebook back**

The annotations and reader response sheet will be graded the first day of school. Be prepared to discuss *The Book Thief* the first week of school. If you do not complete the annotations and reader response sheet by the first day of class, you will receive a zero on the assignment.

The Book Thief Reader Response Sheet

Please type your responses on a Google Document. If you don't have access to a device during the summer, handwrite your responses, and then type them when you are issued a Chromebook.

1.	It was about: (one paragraph-5 sentences-you can use the following outline for your summary) -Somebody (the main character) -Wanted (what did the main character want?) -But (something happened to cause a problem) -So (what did the main character do about it?) -Then (then what happened?)
2.	Who do you think the audience was for the book (Teenagers? Adults? Certain adults? Certain age groups? Americans?) How do you know this?
3.	Describe one part of the book that you identified with/connected to. How did it relate to you/others/modern events? Write at least $\underline{3}$ sentences.
4.	What do you think the author's purpose was in writing the book, AND why do you think that way? -Was it to teach people about something? Was it to give us their thoughts on something? Was it to help us understand something better?
5.	What was the big idea or theme of the book? This is not plot summary! A theme is not: this book was about how the character got into a fight.
6.	What is one sentence from the book that illustrates the theme you identified? How does that sentence reveal the theme? -Write the sentence with quotes around it and the author's last name and page number at the end. Example-"" (Zusak).
7.	What was 1 strength of the book? Why?
8.	What was 1 weakness of the book (if any)? Why?
9.	What is your overall evaluation of this book?
