The 2023-2024 school year has taken off! Our teachers spent the first week of school getting to know their new students, setting expectations, and creating a positive classroom environment. September went by quickly with the starting and finishing of our fundraiser, practicing of important safety drills, and testing iReady ELA and Math. You may notice a lower number of grades in the grade book at this time due to these activities.

The month of October brings the first mid-term grading date as well as Parent-Teacher Conferences. For those of you who are new to Tomah Middle School, we do not mail home progress reports. The first conference creates a strong partnership between home and school for our students. This is an opportunity for you to get a better understanding of your child's social and academic progress. We strongly encourage you to bring your child with you to these conferences.

Each year, we select a collective focus for our building. Our building goal for this year centers on increasing student achievement in the areas of literacy and math. Our educators have also chosen specific goals to work on within their curriculum this year as well.

We continue to make school safety a priority at TMS. The month of October is National Bullying Prevention Month. We will spend time this month discussing what bullying is and is not, ways to report bullying at school, and how to build positive friendships. To help us communicate the importance of being kind and standing up for each other, Terrence Talley will be in our district on Monday, October 16th talking with students about being kind to others, finding hope, and being resilient when facing adversity. TMS Reminders:

- <u>Door Dash items</u>: We have had a couple of door dash deliveries. We are not able to accommodate these deliveries in a timely manner due to different lunches periods and the availability of staff to deliver. Please do not have door dash deliver to the middle school.
- <u>Chromebook Information:</u> We are having difficulty with students coming to school without a charged Chromebook. Student Chromebooks are used for assignments and include many subjects' textbooks, so it is imperative that the Chromebooks are charged. Unfortunately, we do not have the outlets needed to charge every Chromebook. Some classrooms only have one available outlet. We no longer assign homework; however, if you child has missing work it may be due to this problem. We are asking for your help to please create a plan at home to ensure that your student can be ready for school every day. Thank you.
- Beverage Reminder: Students can only drink water in the hallways and classroom. If your child comes to school with anything other than water, they will be told to go to the cafeteria to finish the drink. If it is close to 7:55 am, they may need to pour it out. We have had issues with stained carpets and insects in the past and thankfully, with this practice, we have seen a major decline in both. Also, thank you for ensuring students are not bringing highly caffeinated beverages to school. We have noticed a difference!

Counselors' Corner

We have a new face in the counseling office - Mrs. Brienna Broughton is our new school counselor. We are not splitting students up alphabetically, nor by grades. Students are welcome to visit with either of the counselors. If you would like to contact either of us, please sign up on the Counselors' Corner on Schoology, visit us at school, or have your student's teacher or guardian reach out to either of us in the counseling office.

Mrs. King and Mrs. Broughton are both teaching 6th grade Counseling Connections classes. It's a unique opportunity to get to know each of our 6th graders and to help build a strong school community where everyone feels they belong.

Students are starting Second Step lessons during their Wednesdays Tito Time. We want your middle schooler to be successful in school, and that means supporting and encouraging their whole development. While excelling in academic classes is important, students also need skills for learning challenges, making good decisions, handling strong emotions, and getting along with others. This month, we began Second Step® Middle School, a research-based social-emotional learning program designed to improve students' social-emotional skills, such as emotion management, impulse control, problem solving, and empathy.

September was Suicide Prevention month, and we focused on promoting the importance of mental health and reaching out for help when we are struggling.

If your student is struggling with thoughts of self-harm remember to ACT:

- A- **Acknowledge** the problem
- C- Let the person know you care
- T- Tell a responsible adult (like your counselors, teachers, or trusted adult at home)

In 2021, 17.2% of students ages 15 and younger seriously considered death by suicide. We hope to continue creating awareness, for all students and families, about the resources available to help when our struggles seem hopeless. We continue to focus on "creating hope for our community by taking positive action". We handed out blue/purple suicide prevention ribbons to all students as a reminder that they are not alone, and there is help available when needed.

We were in the 7th grade classes in September with our ACP lessons and with our 8th grade classes in October working on Academic and Career Planning.
